U.S. Imposes 50% Tariffs on Canadian Goods as Talks Collapse

WASHINGTON — The United States imposed 50% tariffs on more than \$20 billion in Canadian goods after midnight Saturday, hours after trade negotiations between the two governments broke down. The measures cover roughly 5% of what Canada ships south, and they sit on top of tariffs already in place on steel, lumber and automobiles.

U.S. Trade Representative Jamieson Greer said Canada had declined to finalize a deal under terms both sides agreed to earlier in the week, citing new demands and what he called walk-backs of earlier commitments. Canadian officials have not accepted that description of events. Prime Minister Mark Carney said the two governments made important progress but fell short of what Canada needed, and he pledged to retaliate dollar for dollar. He said support for affected workers and companies would be announced within days.

One mechanical point gets lost in the headlines. A tariff is collected from the importer, not from the exporting country. American firms buying Canadian goods pay the 50% at the border and then decide how much of it to pass to their customers. How much of it reaches shelf prices depends on whether those buyers can find substitutes, which is why the composition of the \$20 billion matters more than the headline rate does.

President Trump had sounded optimistic about a deal as late as Friday, which suggests the breakdown came quickly. Neither government has said whether talks will resume.

BACKGROUND

This is the latest turn in a trade fight Trump reopened with Canada in early 2025. Each cycle has run the same course: a deadline, a near-deal, a collapse, matching retaliation, and eventually a partial rollback. Canada sends roughly three-quarters of its exports to the United States, which hands Washington the stronger hand in a tariff exchange. It also makes Canadian domestic politics unforgiving of anything that looks like capitulation, which is part of why these rounds keep ending this way.

Why it matters: *Escalation is cheap to announce and expensive to unwind. Both governments now have to defend a position taken in public before either has counted what it costs at home.*

What to watch: *Carney said Canada's retaliation list is coming within days. Watch which American exports it names. The choice is usually political, aimed at states whose representatives can pressure the White House.*

Trump Declares Economic Warfare on Iran as Gas Hits an August Record

WASHINGTON — The national average price of gasoline stands at about \$4.06 a gallon, close to a dollar above where it was a year ago and the highest level ever recorded for August. The cause is not domestic. The U.S. and Israel have been at war with Iran since late February, and shipping through the Strait of Hormuz, the narrow passage carrying roughly a fifth of the world's seaborne oil, has not returned to normal. Brent crude spiked to \$112 a barrel in March and has settled near \$85.

This week the administration announced what it calls Operation Economic Fury, an escalation built around secondary sanctions. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent warned that companies and countries continuing to buy Iranian oil would face the full force of the U.S. government. The obvious targets are China and India, Iran's largest customers.

Analysts disagree sharply about whether this works. Richard Goldberg argues that months of strikes and a naval blockade have created conditions unlike previous sanctions rounds, and that the outcome is genuinely unpredictable. Ali Vaez of the International Crisis Group counters that Iran has absorbed sanctions for four decades and that pressure without a credible offer of relief accomplishes nothing. Both are describing the same facts and reaching opposite conclusions, which is a fair signal of how uncertain this is.

A 60-day negotiating deadline passed on August 17 with no agreement on Iran's nuclear program. The congressional Joint Economic Committee estimates Americans have paid about \$56.4 billion extra for fuel over six months, roughly \$477 per household.

BACKGROUND

Sanctions on Iran are not new; the U.S. has maintained some form of them since 1979. What is new is the combination with active warfare and a disrupted Hormuz. Secondary sanctions work by making third parties choose between the U.S. financial system and the sanctioned country, which is effective when the dollar is unavoidable and less so as trade routes around it develop.

Why it matters: *Sanctions designed to pressure a foreign government are also a tax on American drivers. Whether that trade is worth making is a political judgment, not a technical one, and it is being made without a vote.*

What to watch: *Whether China's refiners actually cut Iranian purchases, and whether any date is set for talks to resume. Both are observable within weeks.*

Supreme Court Lets White House Ballroom Construction Continue

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court on Friday stayed a lower-court injunction, allowing construction of a new White House ballroom to continue while litigation proceeds. The order was brief and signed by Chief Justice John Roberts. It resolves nothing about the underlying question.

In March, Federal District Judge Richard Leon ordered above-ground work halted, holding that Congress had never appropriated money for the project. Congress controls federal spending under Article I of the Constitution, and the National Trust for Historic Preservation argues that the administration, rather than seeking that approval, is trying to build fast enough that courts cannot meaningfully intervene. In its filing the Trust wrote that the government has decided to try to outrun judicial review.

The administration's position is that the structure serves national security and military functions and that delay carries its own costs. The building occupies the former East Wing site, runs about 90,000 square feet, and is roughly twice the footprint of the main White House. Estimated cost to taxpayers has passed \$300 million, despite earlier statements that private money would cover it. Announced features include bomb shelters, a medical facility and a drone port.

A stay is a procedural ruling about who bears the risk while a case is decided, not a judgment on the merits. But when the disputed act is pouring concrete, the distinction thins. A Washington Post-ABC News-Ipsos poll in April found 56% of Americans disapproved of the project.

BACKGROUND

The last full-year appropriations fight this pointed involved impoundment, the practice of a president declining to spend money Congress allocated. Congress banned it in 1974. This dispute runs the other direction: spending on something Congress never approved. Courts have historically been reluctant to referee spending disputes between the branches, preferring that Congress use its own tools, but Congress has been slow to use them.

Why it matters: *If a project can be completed before a court decides whether it was lawful, the ruling becomes advisory. That is a structural problem larger than any one building.*

What to watch: *Whether the Court sets the case for full argument or lets the stay stand indefinitely, and whether Judge Leon's distinction between above- and below-ground work survives.*

Back-to-School Spending Sets a Record, and Supplies Are the Smallest Part

WASHINGTON — Families with children in kindergarten through 12th grade expect to spend an average of \$863.86 on back-to-school purchases this year, according to the National Retail Federation's annual survey, a nominal increase over last year's \$858.07 that adds up to a record \$43.3 billion nationally. The survey polled 7,677 consumers between July 1 and July 8 with a stated margin of error of 1.1 percentage points.

The composition of that spending is considerably more interesting than the total: electronics lead at \$293.11 per student, followed by clothing at \$250.29 and shoes at \$174.01, while the actual school supplies that appear on a teacher's list come last at \$146.45, roughly 17 percent of the whole. College families report spending \$1,437.79 per student.

Two cautions belong on these numbers. The National Retail Federation is a trade association representing retailers, and its survey measures stated intentions in early July rather than receipts collected in September, a distinction that matters because the two regularly diverge. More consequentially, a nominal increase of \$5.79 on a base of \$858 falls well below inflation, which means real spending per family declined even as the national total established a record, a record driven by enrollment and by prices rather than by families purchasing more.

NRF Chief Economist Mark Mathews framed affordability as the season's central concern. One supporting indicator: only 41 percent of shoppers plan to purchase online this year, the lowest proportion since 2016, which analysts interpret as evidence of comparison shopping in physical stores rather than a retreat from e-commerce.

BACKGROUND

Back-to-school is the second-largest retail season after the winter holidays, which is why the figure gets published and quoted every August. It has slowly stopped being a stationery number: electronics were a rounding error in these surveys twenty years ago and are now the largest single line, reflecting how much of the school list has moved onto a device.

Why it matters: *A record total paired with a real per-family decline is the same data telling two stories. Which one gets reported shapes what people believe about their own finances.*

What to watch: *Actual August and September retail sales data from the Census Bureau, which will show whether the intentions held.*

TERM TO KNOW

secondary sanctions

Penalties aimed not at the target country itself but at third parties — foreign banks, shippers, insurers and buyers — for doing business with it. The leverage runs through someone who is not the adversary.

Used in a sentence: When the Treasury threatens an Indian refinery for buying Iranian crude, that is a secondary sanction: the refinery has done nothing to the United States, and is being asked to choose between two customers.

SCIENCE & TECH

NASA Clears the Roman Space Telescope for an August 30 Launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, FLA. — Mission managers from NASA and SpaceX completed a Flight Readiness Review at Kennedy Space Center on Friday, certifying the Nancy Grace Roman Space Telescope for final launch preparations. Liftoff is targeted for no earlier than 7:26 a.m. Eastern on Sunday, August 30, aboard a Falcon Heavy from Launch Complex 39A. The observatory, already enclosed in its payload fairing, moves to SpaceX's hangar for mating to the rocket.

Roman carries a primary mirror the same 2.4 meters across as Hubble's, but its field of view is about 100 times wider. That single design choice defines the mission. Hubble and Webb are built to stare; Roman is built to survey. It can map large areas of sky repeatedly, which is what you need to detect things that change or to gather statistics across millions of galaxies rather than detailed portraits of a few.

The two headline science goals are dark energy and exoplanets. Dark energy is the name given to whatever is causing the universe's expansion to accelerate; naming it is not the same as understanding it, and Roman is designed to measure its behavior over cosmic time rather than explain it. For planets, Roman will use gravitational microlensing, in which a foreground star's gravity briefly magnifies a background star and reveals otherwise invisible companions.

The launch is running roughly nine months ahead of the original schedule, which is unusual enough for a flagship observatory to be worth noting on its own.

BACKGROUND

Roman was recommended by the 2010 astronomy decadal survey, formally started in 2016, and survived several proposed cancellations in budget cycles since. Its wide-field instrument reuses a 2.4-meter mirror donated to NASA by the National Reconnaissance Office, which is part of why the optics were comparatively inexpensive.

Why it matters: Survey instruments rarely produce a single famous image, so they are easy to undervalue. They tend to produce the datasets that other people's discoveries come out of for the next twenty years.

What to watch: The August 30 launch window itself, and then roughly three months of commissioning before the first science data.

Yankees Beat Toronto 3-1 Despite Being Outhit 9-4

BRONX, N.Y. — The Yankees defeated the Toronto Blue Jays 3-1 on Friday night at Yankee Stadium in a game that illustrates how little raw hit totals explain. Toronto collected nine hits to New York's four and lost, going 1-for-14 with runners in scoring position.

Spencer Jones supplied the difference with a two-run homer in the second inning. Cam Schlichter earned the win to move to 11-6, and David Bednar recorded his 30th save. Toronto's run came in the fifth on an Alejandro Kirk single that scored Brett Bateman, who finished 3-for-5. Spencer Arrighetti took the loss, falling to 7-6.

Blue Jays manager John Schneider was direct about it afterward, saying his team simply needed the big hit and crediting Schlittler as one of the better pitchers in the league. That is the honest reading. Sequencing, not volume, decides most one-run games, and a team can be outhit by more than two to one and still deserve the win.

The series continues this weekend in the Bronx, with Toronto expecting Vladimir Guerrero Jr. back from a concussion. These are division opponents, so head-to-head results carry more weight in the standings than the same record against anyone else would.

BACKGROUND

The gap between hits and runs is the reason batting average has lost ground to on-base and slugging measures in how teams evaluate hitters. A single with nobody on and a single with two on are the same hit and very different events, and box-score hit totals treat them identically.

Why it matters: Games like this are the argument for watching the whole thing rather than reading the line score. The number that looked decisive was the one that didn't matter.

What to watch: The rest of the weekend series, and whether Guerrero's return changes Toronto's production with runners on.

SOUTHERN MAINE

Shark Sightings Continue Along the Southern Maine Coast

KENNEBUNKPORT, MAINE — Sharks were sighted Thursday off Gooch's Beach in Kennebunk and Goose Rocks Beach in Kennebunkport. Kennebunkport police issued a social media advisory asking beachgoers to remain alert, to exit the water calmly and alert others if they see one, and to call the department's business line. No species identification was made in either sighting, and no closure was ordered.

That detail is worth holding onto. A shark sighting is a report by a person on a beach or a boat, not a confirmed identification, and the two get conflated fast in coverage. Some sightings are basking sharks, which are harmless filter feeders, or seals breaking the surface.

The sightings fit a pattern this summer. Wells Beach closed to swimmers on August 12 after a sighting, and there have been reports from Biddeford and Scarborough, where a lifeguard was reportedly pulled underwater earlier this month. Great white sharks move up the Gulf of Maine in late summer following gray seals, whose population has grown substantially since the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 ended hunting of them.

The underlying story is a recovering ecosystem rather than a new danger. More seals means more of what eats seals, in the same water where people swim in August.

BACKGROUND

Maine recorded its first fatal shark attack in 2020, off Bailey Island. Before that the state had no confirmed fatality on record. The change in shark presence tracks the seal recovery closely, which is a case of a successful conservation law producing a consequence that was foreseeable but not much discussed at the time.

Why it matters: *Advisories are only as good as the identification behind them. Towns balancing tourism against caution have to make decisions on thin information, and the thinness rarely makes it into the alert.*

What to watch: *Whether any Southern Maine town orders closures over the weekend, and what tagged-shark tracking data shows for the Gulf of Maine through Labor Day.*

A River Otter Turns Up in the Bronx for the First Time in a Century

BRONX, N.Y. — A North American river otter has been documented along the Bronx River, the first recorded there in roughly 100 years. RJ Hawkins, a local scientist working with the Wildlife Conservation Society's education department at the Bronx Zoo, captured the image on a motion-activated camera trap on June 23. The zoo announced the finding on August 19.

Otters are used as indicator species because their requirements are demanding and specific: clean water, a reliable fish population, and connected habitat along the bank. An otter showing up is therefore evidence about the river rather than about the otter. Hawkins called it an incredible moment and said it may be the first documented in the Bronx in generations. Bronx Zoo director Craig Piper framed it as the story of an urban river coming back to life.

The honest caveat: this is one animal on one camera. It establishes that the river can support an otter passing through, not that a breeding population has established itself. Those are different claims, and only repeated sightings over several seasons will distinguish them.

Still, the trajectory is real. Otters disappeared from New York's waterways through a combination of pollution, habitat loss and unregulated trapping. Beavers returned to the same river in 2007 after an absence of more than two centuries. Decades of restoration work preceded both.

BACKGROUND

The Bronx River cleanup began in earnest in the 1970s and has involved dam removal, sewage infrastructure, bank restoration and sustained volunteer labor from neighborhood organizations. It is frequently cited as a model for urban river restoration precisely because the payoffs arrived on a timescale longer than most political careers.

Why it matters: *Environmental restoration is usually judged on money spent because results take decades to appear. This is what a result looks like, and it arrived long after the people who funded the work had moved on.*

What to watch: *Whether additional otter detections turn up on the camera network this fall, which is what would separate a wanderer from a resident.*

WORTH ARGUING ABOUT
